CONNECTION TO A PUBLIC WATER SYSTEM CERTIFICATE OF WATER AVAILABLILITY

Use this for if you are proposing connection to a Public Water System

Purpose: To assure the availability of potable drinking water per RCW 19.27 and Article III of the Thurston County Sanitary Code.

Issuance of a Certificate of Water Availability (COWA) is required prior to issuance of all building permits for new construction or change of use when potable drinking water is required.

CERTIFICATE OF WATER AVAILABILITY (COWA) INSTRUCTIONS CONNECTION TO A PUBLIC WATER SYSTEM

- **STEP 1** Have the middle section of the form completed by the purveyor or owner of the public water system.
- **STEP 2** Submit the form to:

STEP 3 Group A Public Water Systems: Thurston County Permit Assistance Center staff reviews the water system adequacy report provided by the Washington State Department of Health and issues the certificate if the requirements to demonstrate water availability are met.

Group B Public Water Systems: Thurston County Environmental Health staff evaluates the public water system records to determine whether the proposed connection is within the scope of system approval, and if the system is in compliance with water quality monitoring and other operational requirements. Environmental Health staff will then recommend whether or not a certificate of water availability should be approved. The Permit Assistance Center staff issues the certificate if the requirements to demonstrate water availability are met.
